Why Public Engagement? Whether it is Coffee with Council, the Annual General Meeting - April 11, 7 pm at the MD of Taber's Main Operations & Maintenance Facility, Open Houses, or a Council meeting, we need to hear your ideas and opinions. Your Councillor is a great conduit, but your direct involvement helps ensure new bylaws and plans meet the municipality's needs for the next decade. Besides the Transportation Master Plan, 2024 will have open houses for the Land Use Bylaw, which will see significant changes, and the Lands Policy to guide the management of our 62,000 acres.

The Transportation Master Plan is underway and will soon be reviewed by Council. Your insights during the open houses and surveys will influence the plan development. The management of the 2,400 km of roadways is Council's top priority. Continue to call the office or submit road concerns via Service Tracker found on the MD of Taber App or by visiting our website at mdtaber.ab.ca/p/service-tracker

MD of Taber is proud to announce our newly appointed Agricultural Fieldman, Jordan Holst. He was instrumental in organising the provincial Agriculture Service Board conference in Lethbridge.

Members from across the province discussed impactful resolutions to help advance agricultural practices and took in insightful speakers. Lantic Sugar provided a unique insight into the impact of the sugar beet and sugar processing in southern Alberta. Due to increased awareness and concern, ASB will host a mental health workshop in late Fall. Drought conditions are everyone's concern. We are currently developing a water management strategy in conjunction with the Government of Alberta and Irrigation Districts, as well as lobbying to improve water security through increased on and off-stream storage, with a priority on the Eyremore Dam. Council will champion a resolution at the Rural Municipalities Association on water apportionment, to assist with reservoir management. While we hope for meaningful snowfall, it is prudent to plan for potential water restrictions.

Phase 1 of the Southern Regional Storm Water Drainage project is nearing

completion, with Phase 2 in preparation for tender. The Southern Regional Stormwater Drainage Committee has been instrumental, along with the municipal partners, the St Mary River Irrigation District, and the Governments of Canada and Alberta, to ensure resiliency to flooding and protection of critical infrastructure necessary for drinking water and food security.

Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) remain a point of pride and a vital resource for residents. They offer a range of programs and services for infants to seniors, including tax filing, counselling, newcomer support groups, and so much more. Details at [fcss.ca](https://www.fcss.ca).

Council encourages you to visit a library. Our residents can access the six libraries in our District including Hays, Enchant, Grassy Lake, Barnwell, Vauxhall, and Taber. Spring demands vigilant attention, knowledge, and proactive measures for effective tree care. To assist landowners in this endeavour, we present guidelines for spring tree and shrub care. By seamlessly integrating these tips into your routine, you not only create an environment where trees survive but thrive, enhancing the beauty and sustainability of your landscape. Keep in mind that each tree is unique, and understanding its specific needs is crucial for successful spring tree care.



- 1. Assessing Winter Damages:** Before engaging in active tree care, it is imperative to evaluate potential winter damage to trees and other landscape plants. Scrutinize branches, trunks, and roots for stress indicators, such as broken limbs, cracks, or raised roots. Timely attention to issues stemming from snow and ice can prevent further damage and promote a robust recovery.
- 2. Assessing Winter Burn and Dieback Damages:** Certain coniferous tree varieties, including spruces and cedars, may exhibit signs of winter burn, evident in needle browning and bronzing. The combination of intense cold and strong winds can lead to desiccation, resulting in needle shedding in evergreens and branch dieback in deciduous trees. Recognizing and addressing this dieback mechanism early on supports overall tree survival.
- 3. Assessing for Pests:** Before leafing out, conduct a thorough inspection for pests. Look for signs of diseases such as cankers, blackened and curled twigs, black knots, Cytospora canker, and other fungal infestations. Additionally, check for insect infestations like scales, mites, beetles, and borers, including exit holes and sawdust. Lastly, inspect for wildlife damage from porcupines, voles, deer, moose, and beavers.
- 4. Pruning:** Late winter and early spring represent optimal times for tree pruning. Remove dead, damaged, or diseased branches to enhance air circulation and reduce the risk of pest infestation. Selective pruning can also improve tree structure and fruit production.

Exercise caution not to over-prune, as it may stress the tree. Address dead branches within shelterbelts to mitigate fire risks.

- 5. Soil Health Assessment:** Healthy soil forms the foundation for robust tree growth. Conduct a soil test to determine pH and nutrient levels, and fertilize based on soil lab results. Adjust pH if necessary and provide balanced, slow-release fertilizers. Avoid excessive fertilization to prevent nutrient imbalances and tree harm.
- 6. Mulching:** Apply a 4–6-inch-thick layer of organic mulch, such as shredded bark or wood chips, to shield tree roots. Mulching enriches the soil, enhances fertility, improves structure, and inhibits weed growth. Establish a doughnut-shaped wood chip cover around the tree to conserve moisture and minimize soil freezing.
- 7. Watering:** Adequate watering, especially during dry periods, is crucial in early spring. Ensure thorough saturation of the root zone, particularly for young trees establishing strong root systems. Be mindful of overwatering to prevent root rot. Mulching aids in moisture retention, reducing the need for frequent watering. Test soil and water for sodium levels, avoiding watering with high sodium content.

(ACT) WATER CONSERVATION

Are you worried about water but aren't sure of the best place to start conserving?

Southern Alberta is facing a severe drought situation in 2024. Here is a list of possible actions along with the estimated cost, effort, and impact of each one. We suggest five steps for successful conservation:

1. Understand your water usage
2. Check for leaks
3. Do all low effort-zero cost items on the list
4. Review all high impact items and select 1 or 2 that are most relevant or that you are best able to accomplish
5. Make a triage plan now to help your garden survive an extreme drought

DUST SUPPRESSION PROGRAM 2024



Rural residents can combat gravel road dust through the Municipal District of Taber Dust Suppression Program. The program, using MG 30, a blend of calcium chloride and magnesium hydroxide, not only curbs dust but also fortifies the road surface. Additionally, MG 30 prevents washboard roads and gravel loss at critical points like intersections and hills. The cost is **\$1.42 per linear foot**, with a minimum treatment length of 400 feet.

INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM 2024

➤ Grassy Lake Landfill Reclamation

East Butte Contractors have been awarded the contract for the Grassy Lake Landfill Reclamation project. The initiative aims to clear historic landfill waste from the north side of Grassy Lake, creating space for an upcoming residential subdivision. The project is scheduled for completion this spring, including the final seeding phase.

➤ Grassy Lake North Subdivision

Phase 1 of the Grassy Lake North Subdivision is currently in the design stage and is anticipated to be constructed by the end of 2024. This development will provide over 40 new residential lots for purchase in the near future.

➤ Bridge Replacements

A funding application has been submitted for approval, proposing three bridge replacements within the MD of Taber. Upon approval, the project will progress to the design phase, followed by the tendering process for construction.

➤ 2024 Shoulder Pull & Gravel Recovery Program

This year's plan includes the construction of approximately 34 kilometers of shoulder pull and the recovery of 133.5 kilometers of gravel.

➤ Township Road 9-4 Asphalt Overlay

A 4-kilometer asphalt overlay is scheduled for Township Road 9-4 east of Range Road 16-4 this summer. This effort aims to rectify the deficient shape of the crown and extend the longevity of the hard surface.

➤ Transportation Master Plan

Al-Terra consultants have been engaged to conduct a comprehensive study for the Transportation Master Plan. The study includes various public engagement events held in person and online earlier this year. Subsequent months will involve a detailed analysis of available data, culminating in a final report to be approved by Council later in the year. This report will serve as a guiding document for the MD's transportation network investments in the future.

The Local Business Highlight Videos form an integral part of the "Support Local" initiative in the MD of Taber.

In collaboration with Community Futures, the MD of Taber has successfully produced and unveiled seven compelling promotional videos showcasing various local businesses. 
