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REEVE'S REFLECTIONS

As we approach fall, I hope everyone has had the opportunity to relish the outdoors this past summer before the bitter return of winter hits.

The conclusion of the anticipated Cornfest weekend was a highly successful and well-attended event. It is truly heartening to witness the community coming together to celebrate our region and its exceptional qualities as a place to reside, work, and raise families. Following the conclusion of Cornfest, a noticeable autumn chill fills the air, a familiar marker of the changing seasons. This year is no exception, as everyone is engaged in the initiation of the harvest and the gathering of crops into storage bins.

In the irrigated zones of our municipality, the crops are flourishing, surpassing even the average yield. Conversely, for those in the dryland regions, the crop yields have been disappointingly low—some as meagre as 25% of the usual output. The prevailing weather patterns echo the nature of our locale, characterized as a desert. The irrigation reservoirs stand nearly empty, rivers flow at minimal levels, the grasslands have turned brown, and the dire need for moisture is evident. Throughout my tenure,

I have observed cycles of arid years and periods of abundant rainfall, yet I must honestly admit that this is the driest spell I have ever witnessed within our area.

A warm congratulations is extended to Mr. Bryce Surina, assuming the position of Director of Community Services. With 22 years of experience in the MD, where he previously served as the Director of Information Technology and GIS, Bryce brings extensive knowledge of our municipality to his new role. This expanded responsibility for Bryce encompasses oversight of Regional Enforcement Services, Regional Fire Services, Lands, Planning and Development, and our Economic Development initiatives.

Over the past year, both Council and administration have convened numerous workshops to deliberate on the Land Use Bylaw and strategise changes that would advance development within the MD. Guided by our planning advisor, Bonnie Brunner, and in partnership with the Oldman River Regional Services Commission, the rewriting of the Bylaw has been entrusted. Following this process, Council and the administration will present the revised document for public

consultations, which are anticipated to transpire across the municipality in 2024.

The construction of the Horsefly Emergency Spillway has progressed steadfastly throughout the summer months. Commuters on Highway 36 north of Taber may have encountered minor delays as DeGraaf Excavating executed the installation of cement culverts along the highway segment. The comprehensive endeavour took approximately six weeks to complete, with any associated delays on either side of the project being relatively negligible. The construction will persist, and Range Road 16-5 to the north of Taber will be temporarily closed during the installation of the cement culverts at that crossing. We sincerely appreciate everyone's cooperation and understanding during the course of this project.

On June 20th, Council convened with the residents of Grassy Lake for an engaging Coffee with Council session. This well-attended event provided an invaluable opportunity to connect with the community and gather insights into their concerns. perspectives, both positive and areas

needing improvement.

Council has conducted the initial review of the 2024 Capital Budget, outlining the proposed projects and allocations. The **Enchant Residential Subdivision, comprising** 36 new lots, is now completed, awaiting final billing to determine the lot prices. Furthermore, our budget accommodates the progression of the new Grassy Lake Residential Subdivision, introducing 46 additional lots. Our commitment to improving road conditions continues through activities such as gravel recovery and shoulder maintenance. Addressing the road edges and enhancing drainage mechanisms will yield long-term benefits, saving time and resources in future road rehabilitation endeavours. Within the Capital Budget proposal, provisions have been made for essential equipment acquisitions to support the maintenance, grading, and upkeep of roads. In the upcoming weeks, we will undertake the initial assessment of the proposed operating budget, engaging in deliberations and adjustments as necessary.

As we navigate through the fall season, I extend my wishes for a safe return to school, a successful harvest, and a continued emphasis on safety for all.

HORSEFLY EMERGENCY SPILLWAY UPDATE

Project Overview

The Horsefly Regional Emergency Spillway Project represents a collaborative endeavor undertaken in partnership with the municipalities of Coaldale, Taber, Bow Island, and the Village of Barnwell, along with the Counties of Lethbridge, 40 Mile, Cypress, and Warner. Engaged entities also encompass Alberta Transportation and Economic Corridors, Alberta Environment, the City of Medicine Hat, the St. Mary River Irrigation District (SMRID), and the MD of Taber, assuming the role of the lead managing partner.

Project Objective

The principal aim of the Horsefly Regional Emergency Spillway Project resides in its capacity to effectively facilitate the discharge of approximately fifty percent of water flow from the SMRID main canal, situated to the south of Taber, during instances of severe flooding, as previously observed in incidents such as the most recent occurrence in 2018. In circumstances where the infrastructure for excess water retention is insufficient, the project is designed to redirect this overflow directly into the Oldman River. Executed in three distinct phases, the project spans from the SMRID main canal in the southern vicinity of Taber, extends to Horsefly Reservoir, progresses to Taber Lake, and culminates at the Oldman River. Notably, the entire undertaking is seamlessly integrated within the pre-existing infrastructure of the SMRID canal network.

Funding Mechanisms

Project funding for the endeavor is derived from a combination of grants provided by the Province of Alberta and the Government of Canada, and financial contributions from the Southern Regional Stormwater Drainage Committee partners.

Phase 1: Taber Lake to Oldman River

In Phase 1, an existing SMRID lateral will be enlarged from Taber Lake to the Oldman River, which is primarily used for irrigation from May to October. Furthermore, Phase 1 encompasses the expansion of an existing SMRID drainage trench, that will divert surplus floodwaters to the Oldman River. Noteworthy within Phase 1 are four road-crossing culverts earmarked for

replacement with large-diameter concrete box culverts, the establishment of five new or renewed concrete drop/check structures to regulate fluid dynamics, and the deposition of large diameter rock within the coulee, directing the flow toward the Oldman River. With this section of the project already well underway, it is anticipated to reach completion by the spring of 2024.

Phase 2: Horsefly Reservoir to Taber Lake

The sequel, Phase 2, begins at the northern point of Horsefly Reservoir, extending to Taber Lake, through existing SMRID infrastructure. Within this phase, the replacement of two MD of Taber road allowance crossings with large-diameter concrete box culverts is scheduled, located just east of Taber. These Highway 3 crossings have been made to align with the Highway 3 Twinning project, with funding for this aspect being secured from Alberta Transportation and Economic Corridors. Further aspects encompass the negotiation of the extant CP Rail mainline (comprising two lines) and the Lantic Sugar railway spur line, utilizing bridge-culvert configurations for traversal. Numerous existing concrete drop/check structures are earmarked for enlargement or renewal in this phase, alongside the expansion of the existing SMRID lateral. Additionally, Phase 2 will incorporate a wetland component at the entrance to Taber Lake. This phase is scheduled for implementation during the fall and winter of 2024/2025.

Phase 3: SMRID Main Canal to Horsefly Reservoir

Phase 3 extends from the SMRID main canal to the southern Horsefly Reservoir of Taber. This segment includes the construction of a new outlet stemming from the SMRID main canal, accompanied by the replacement or modification of several drop/check structures along this trajectory. The existing SMRID lateral will undergo reshaping and cleaning, supplemented by the recent establishment of a wetland at the entry point into the Horsefly Reservoir. A solitary MD of Taber road allowance crossing will undergo a larger-diameter culvert replacement during the construction period. The tender process for this phase is planned for the fall of 2023, with construction anticipated to span the fall/winter and end by the close of March 2024.

INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM 2023

> Grassy Lake North Subdivision

Phase 1 of the Grassy Lake North Subdivision is currently in the design stages. This project will see 40+ new residential lots available for purchase in the near future.

> 2023 Shoulder Pull Program

The construction season is underway and is scheduled for completion in November. A total of 32 kilometres are estimated to be completed this year.

> Grassy Lake Stormwater Study

A consultant will be hired to complete a stormwater study of Grassy Lake. We will present a schedule of projects

along with a detailed maintenance plan following the study's completion.

> Range Road 17-3 Grade Widening

The contract has been awarded to McNally Contractors. The project consists of widening the grade for 700 metres, followed by a 2-kilometre asphalt overlay. The project is expected to be completed in October.

> Vauxhall Airport Paving

The contract has been awarded to McNally Contractors. The project consists of an expansion of the taxiway. The project is expected to be completed by mid-September.

SHELTERBELT ESTABLISHMENT PROGRAM



The Municipal District of Taber is entering its fifth year of offering the Shelterbelt Establishment Program to its residents. This initiative has resulted in the planting of over 8,000 trees across the municipality. These trees serve multiple purposes: they act as windbreaks for fields and farmyards, provide habitats for wildlife, and enhance the scenic beauty of the countryside.

The Shelterbelt Establishment Program operates on a cost-sharing basis, with both the landowners and the MD of Taber splitting the cost of trees equally. Additionally, the MD will contribute equipment and labour to assist in the tree planting process. The program offers a

diverse selection of tree species, ranging from pine, spruce, and poplar to elm, ash, willow, caragana, buckthorn, lilac, Saskatoon, chokecherry, and more.

Recent years, marked by blustery winters and springs, underscore the significance of shelterbelts and trees. The challenges posed by soil erosion could have been mitigated by well-designed and properly established shelterbelts, effectively disrupting the wind and lessening its impact on the land.
